



Literacy Powers Learning

Reading is the foundational skill for school success, impacting every aspect of academic achievement across all subjects. That's why learning to read is a student's most important educational challenge. But less than half of Arizona's third graders read at grade level. It's not their fault, it's not right, and we know what to do about it.

Decades of research provides a clear understanding of how skilled reading develops and **how to effectively support children**, including struggling readers, in learning to read. And everyone agrees that we all benefit when our students have the literacy skills they need to be successful in school.

Launched in 2013, Read On Arizona is our state's early literacy initiative. Partners in Read On Arizona have identified and are implementing the comprehensive set of strategies required to drive large-scale improvement in reading proficiency. From 2013 to 2022, Arizona was one of only six states to make gains in fourth grade reading (NAEP).

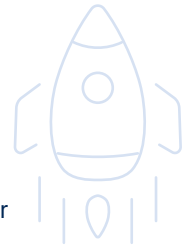

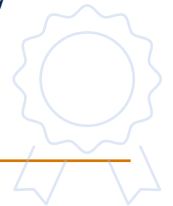

ROA convenes Arizona Chronic Absence Task Force



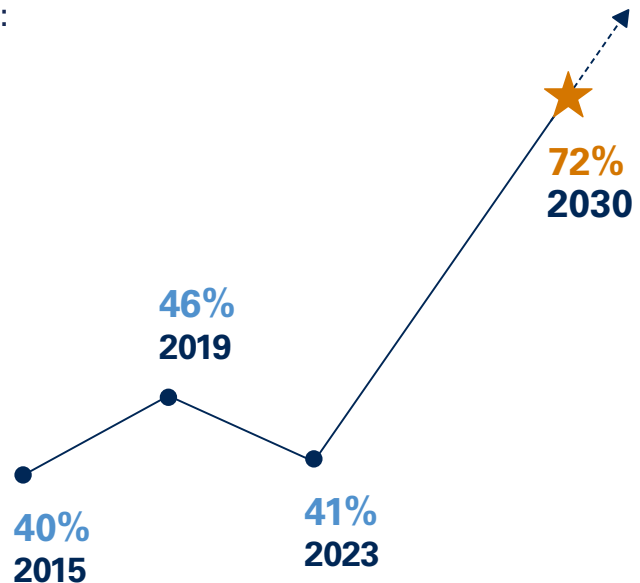
Moving Forward

Our shared goals are for 72% of Arizona's third graders to be reading proficiently by 2030 and 90% by 2040. Reaching these goals requires a comprehensive, collective approach. No single strategy, program, or policy will get us there.

We need to prioritize early literacy in Arizona.

That means working together to take the bold action required to get better literacy outcomes faster:

- 1 Build educator capacity in the science of reading.
- 2 Provide the evidence-based instruction, interventions, and support that each student needs.
- 3 Give families the tools to support their children's language and literacy development.
- 4 Expand access to high-quality early learning.
