College Readiness The Path Starts Early!

Given that early social performance and academic achievement are predictors of later school success, ensuring that children get off to a good start in kindergarten is critical.1

Fewer than half (48%) of children who live below the poverty line are ready for kindergarten, compared to threefourths (75%) of children who come from homes earning middle to high family incomes.2

What We Know...

1. The educational achievement gap starts well before kindergarten. Disparities in language development emerge in infancy and widen in toddlerhood. The most effective solution is to prevent the achievement gap before it starts.

2 Early language abilities are directly related to later reading abilities. Today, only 77% of Arizona's third-graders are proficient in reading.3 In Read On Phoenix target areas, fewer than 60% of third-graders are proficient. 3 Third grade reading proficiency is an important indicator for future success. In fact, third grade students who are not proficient in reading are four times more likely to drop out of high school.4


