The Honorable Doug DuceyGovernor, State of Arizona

As governor, Ducey's priorities are growing the economy, creating jobs, improving outcomes in K–12 education, and balancing

the budget. A champion of limited government, economic development, and Arizona businesses and families, Governor Ducey has pledged to work every day to ensure "Opportunity for All."

Before being elected state treasurer, Ducey was chief executive officer of Cold Stone Creamery. An Arizona-born concept, Cold Stone expanded from a handful of locations to more than 1,400 worldwide under Ducey's management. Governor Ducey was born in Toledo, Ohio. He moved to Arizona to attend Arizona State University's business school, where he earned his bachelor of science in finance in 1986. He and his wife Angela live in Phoenix with their three sons, Jack, Joe, and Sam.

Ralph Smith is senior vice president of the Annie E.

Casey Foundation and the managing director of the Campaign for Grade-Level Reading, an effort to increase rates of third-grade reading proficiency for children from low-income families that includes a network of more than 232 Campaign communities in 42 states, over 200 local funders, and more than 50 civic- and private-sector partners.

Smith has been active in philanthropy for more than two decades, during which he has served on the boards of the Council of Foundations, the Foundation Center, Venture Philanthropy Partners, and the Wells Fargo Regional Foundation.



Terri Clark Arizona Literacy Director

As the state literacy director, Terri Clark leads Read On Arizona, a public/private partnership of agencies, philanthropic organizations, and community stakeholders

committed to creating an effective continuum of supports to improve language and literacy outcomes for Arizona's children from birth through age 8.

Clark is an effective nonprofit executive with an excellent record of leadership and achievement. Before working with Read On Arizona, she served as executive director of Bring Me A Book, a statewide early literacy organization working to strengthen the language and literacy skills of underserved children in California. She graduated with honors from Brown University.



The Honorable John Giles Mayor, City of Mesa

John Giles was elected the 40th mayor of Mesa, Arizona in August 2014. Mayor Giles is committed to taking Mesa to the next level with his NextMesa

vision. He earned degrees from Brigham Young University in political science and Arizona State University's Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law. He has managed his own law firm in downtown Mesa for the past 20 years. As mayor, he serves on numerous local and regional boards and committees.



The Honorable Mark Mitchell Mayor, City of Tempe

Mark Mitchell is a thirdgeneration Arizonan with deep roots in the Tempe community. Before being elected mayor in May 2012,

Mitchell was elected to the Tempe City Council and served three four-year terms. He is on the board of directors of the Greater Phoenix Economic Council and serves as the City of Tempe's representative on the Maricopa Association of Government's Regional Council, Regional Council Executive Committee, Transportation Policy, and Economic Development committees. Mayor Mitchell is a native of Tempe, attending elementary and middle school in the community before graduating from McClintock High School. He earned a political science degree from Arizona State University.



The Honorable Greg StantonMayor, City of Phoenix

Since taking office, Mayor Greg Stanton has worked tirelessly to build a modern economy that works for every Phoenix family. The

mayor's commitment to building a stronger city for middle-class families stems from his own childhood in West Phoenix. Stanton attended Marquette University on the Harry S. Truman Scholarship and earned a law degree from the University of Michigan. Before he was elected mayor in 2011, Stanton served nine years on the Phoenix City Council and as Arizona's deputy attorney general. He and his wife Nicole, who is a prominent local attorney, are both working parents of two young children.



The Honorable Doug NichollsMayor, City of Yuma

Doug Nicholls began his term as mayor of Yuma on January 1, 2014. Raised in Yuma, he attended Yuma High School and Arizona

State University, where he earned a bachelor of science degree in engineering and continued post-baccalaureate studies in transportation engineering. After graduating from ASU in 1994, he remained in the Phoenix area, working for various international engineering firms. Mayor Nicholls has been active in furthering the growth of Yuma by participating in professional and charitable organizations. He was the chairman of the Greater Yuma Economic Development Corporation, a state president in the Arizona Society of Professional Engineers, and a regional leader for Boy Scouts of America.



The Honorable Michael LeVault Mayor, Town of Youngtown

Michael LeVault has had a long and successful career in the political sector. In 1974, he became a local government liaison in the

Illinois Department of Business and Economic Development and, for three years, he was a personnel officer in the Illinois Governor's Office. LeVault was originally elected mayor of Youngtown in 2006, then re-elected in 2007 and 2009. His past community work includes serving as president and board member of Agua Fria Ranch Homeowners' Association, ministry to seniors, inmates, the homeless and hungry, and remedial reading for disadvantaged children. LeVault has a bachelor of arts degree from Southern Illinois University, with a major in political science and a minor in public relations. He is married to Kathryn J. French, PhD.
